

READING(S)

Reading: *Ephesians 3:1-12*

This is the reason that I Paul am a prisoner for Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles — for surely you have already heard of the commission of God's grace that was given me for you, and how the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I wrote above in a few words, a reading of which will enable you to perceive my understanding of the mystery of Christ. In former generations this mystery was not made known to humankind, as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: that is, the Gentiles have become fellow heirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given me by the working of his power. Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ, and to make everyone see what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places. This was in accordance with the eternal purpose that he has carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, in whom we have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in him.

Gospel Reading: *Matthew 2:1-12*

The Holy Gospel according to Matthew, the 2nd chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord!**

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea,

wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'"

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

WEEKLY DEVOTIONS

Monday - Reflection on Isaiah 60:1-6

The lectionary appoints this poem from Isaiah because it served as a backdrop for Matthew as he wrote of the meaning of the birth of Jesus. The light becomes for Matthew the star, and the gold and frankincense are gifts that the magi present. Thus for Matthew the gifts of the magi affirm that Christ is the light that the poem from Isaiah described.

Tuesday - Connections with the Liturgy

Even when today's churches encourage parish contributions via automatic withdrawals from individuals' bank accounts, the liturgy hopes to make clear that at every service, whenever believers celebrate God's gift of grace, they make donations for those in need. Our offerings to help those in need and to pay for the ministries of the church are like the magi's gold, frankincense and myrrh: they are gifts of financial value that come in symbolic praise to God and in recollection of the death of Christ.

Wednesday - Especially for Children

Matthew says nothing about "three" magi, and both female and male maguses would be included in the plural word "magi." Thus any number of both girls and boys in your life can be asked what they would bring as gifts to an infant who everyone knows will die before old age. Children can be reminded that Holy Week is less than four months away, that the crèche is set up near the crucifix.

Thursday - Life on the Earth

Ancient peoples such as Zoroastrian priests believed that the heavenly bodies revealed the divine will, and early Christian theologians taught that God's ways and will were displayed in both nature and Scripture. Only in the last three centuries have some Christians distanced scientific discoveries from religious truth. In this text, the stars themselves bear witness to Christ, and these ancient scientists see it.

Friday - Reflection on the Gospel Reading

This reading proclaims that even as a young child, Jesus is recognized as a king of the Jews who has significance for the entire globe. Even the sky shows new light. Not only Jews, but also people from other religions see God's light in Jesus. Christians have seen their gifts to the poor and to the church as like the gifts of the magi. Herod's threat is a down payment on the cross.

Saturday - A Hymn for the Day

A fine Epiphany hymn is Nikolai Grundtvig's "Bright and glorious is the sky" (ELW 301). In 1801, Grundtvig, esteemed as the greatest Danish hymn writer, wrote this hymn with nineteen stanzas as a way to teach children the meaning of Epiphany. For Grundtvig, all the stars now beckon us to Christ. In our translation, the magi are appropriately called sages.
